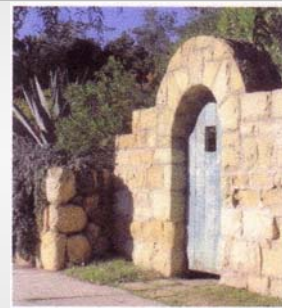

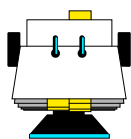
Santa Barbara Police Officer Scott Klacking will meet with Upper

A Neighborhood Watch group works to maintain lines of communication between residents, the City and law enforcement professionals while also addressing law enforcement concerns unique to the Upper East. The program asks neighbors to be alert, observant and caring, and to immediately report crimes and suspicious activity to law enforcement.

## Membership



It's time to renew your membership in the Upper East Association for 2011, or to join if you are not yet a member.

The annual dues for next year will be \$15, a 40% reduction from 2010. We're able to reduce the cost per household because our membership has grown to over 125 property owners (up from 75 in March).

There are about 560 single-family residential properties in the Upper East, of which about 150 are owned by people who do not live at the property. So we have about 410 resident owners.

Our goal is to increase the membership to at least 300 owners, both resident and non-resident, which would allow us to further reduce the annual fee as well as strengthen our voice with City officials.

## Update on Plan Santa Barbara



In April the UEA Board presented a position paper

on the General Plan update to the City Planning Commission. It addressed five issues that are key to preserving the historic nature of the Upper East neighborhood.

On July 29<sup>th</sup> the City Council met to review the current status of the

General Plan update. The Planning Commission's presentation to the Council echoed several of the key points in our position paper, including retaining the current regulations on secondary or 'granny' units and limiting the impact on the Upper East of development in the downtown core.

UEA Vice President Fred Sweeney addressed the Council to reiterate our position on these points.

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### Traffic



As we reported in the last newsletter, the Association submitted a traffic position paper to the City in the spring. Since then, we have been working with City officials to implement our key positions.

It has been, and will remain a tough slog. One of the key impediments is the fact/perception that traffic issues are actually worse in other parts of the City and the Upper East is not the "squeaky wheel." Nevertheless, we have made progress in the past few months, including:

1. A first step in addressing traffic issues at the corner of Santa Barbara St. and Constance
2. A promise by the City to present plans for fixing the safety issue at the corner of Anacapa and Los Olivos – on or about the end of the year.
3. Enhanced communication from the City of any planned traffic engineering changes

4. A promise by the City to address key pedestrian crossing markings

We are in this for the long haul and will continue to strongly campaign to improve traffic problems in our neighborhood.

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### Beautifying the Upper East



Santa Barbara created the **Adopt-A-Block** program to promote teamwork between City staff and residents to keep our neighborhoods clean and clear of graffiti and litter. Residents who join the program make a one-year commitment to keep a block free of graffiti.

of graffiti remover, application brush, safety goggles, rubber gloves, towel and directions for use. These kits are supplied by the City Public Works Department through **Looking Good Santa Barbara**.

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### Walkabouts

On August 25<sup>th</sup> Anthony Grumbine, an architect with Harrison Design Associates, led a group of more than 40 Upper East residents on an architectural tour of the Upper East. He pointed out a number of historically significant homes and the evolution of styles from Italianate through Craftsman to Spanish Colonial Revival. The tour included an inside look at the Fielding Institute building, which is being restored to its original purpose as a residence.
